MAYOR LONGOBARDI: Thank you, Miss Walsh. I would also like to place on the record that

the applicant had previously filed an affidavit of service indicating that all neighbors within a 200 foot radius of the dwelling had been served with notice.

So okay, I ask the applicant's to come up and to please be sworn in.

(Whereupon, John Cavallo and Chris Cavallo were sworn in.)

JOHN CAVALLO: John Cavallo, 350 Union Avenue, Lynbrook.

CHRIS CAVALLO: Chris Cavallo, 12 Wisteria
Avenue, Mineola. I actually should have
brought ribs.

MAYOR LONGOBARDI: So actually guys, if you could tell us what the application is, what you're planning to do. We know it's to serve beer and wine.

CHRIS CAVALLO: We're looking to expand a little bit what we serve there and you know, keep it simple. That's why we're not -- a lot of people call and asked and we also lose a lot of people coming in because unfortunately, we don't serve that. We figured try to come before you guys and see if we can put forth that add to the menu over there.

JOHN CAVALLO: Just offer beer and wine to stay and pretty much not changing anything else around there, just offering that. That's basically it.

MAYOR LONGOBARDI: When you say beer to stay, you wouldn't be selling it to leave?

JOHN CAVALLO: No. If someone is having dinner there, offer them a beer and that's about it.

MAYOR LONGOBARDI: Because I know you do a lot of take-out business.

JOHN CAVALLO: Most of our business is take-out.

CHRIS CAVALLO: Take-out and catering. We lost because six years of being there, a lot of people call and said they want to come in and then ask to bring their own beer but no, you can't, you need the same permit to do that.

Sometimes they get upset and say, we will not be there. A group of ten guys going out for someone's birthday is what we come across the most. They don't venture over due to that reason, which you know --

MAYOR LONGOBARDI: You're not planning anything else like parties or anything else

like that?

JOHN CAVALLO: No. We can't really hold that many. Parties of 8 to 10 will be usually our max, if that. Nothing different than what we are doing now.

CHRIS CAVALLO: If you fill up in there now, it is tough. We'll fill one Friday or Saturday, you know, try to fill again. Maybe this will attract a little more of an increase. Everything in there, an increase brings the community, an increase of what we do with the community on top of that.

MAYOR LONGOBARDI: I will turn it over in case anyone has questions by the Board.

TRUSTEE FITZGERALD: Thank you for coming in. A couple of questions. Are you changing your hours at all?

JOHN CAVALLO: We're thinking about it. Right now, we have nothing set in stone. An extra hour open, not too sure about that.

CHRIS CAVALLO: If we go Friday and Saturday, we wouldn't go past 10:00, if we do even decide to do that. We were going to gauge it when we got in there and took everything in increments.

JOHN CAVALLO: No.

CHRIS CAVALLO: If they come in, sit down and come eat their meal, a rack of ribs. I don't see them going past two beers. It is different stuff.

JOHN CAVALLO: We don't apply for the whole liquor license. We don't want them to come in for that. We emphasize the food.

TRUSTEE FITZGERALD: What about delivery, big beer trucks, how would the delivery be done?

JOHN CAVALLO: I would think --

CHRIS CAVALLO: No, a buddy of ours has a beverage center, Hillside Beverage. We can reach out to him for things. I don't see us with big beer trucks on that street.

TRUSTEE FITZGERALD: The reason for the question is, will it stop traffic flow? Some of those trucks are pretty massive.

JOHN CAVALLO: I don't know for sure. I don't assume it will be. I would like to say we will sell a ton about -- I don't see a future of that. I don't know how to answer that fully.

TRUSTEE FITZGERALD: Thank you.

JOHN CAVALLO: Not a problem.

TRUSTEE POMBONYO: Hi. Thank you for coming in and thank you.

JOHN CAVALLO: Thank you for having us.

TRUSTEE POMBONYO: You've been providing

Floral Park with such a wonderful restaurant.

I just want to add too, I don't know if

everyone knows, but thank you for all the work

you do with the students and special needs and

accommodating them in the restaurant.

Secondly, providing an opportunity for them to

have hands-on learning experience in a

restaurant with the school's district staff.

JOHN CAVALLO: There's no need to thank us for that.

CHRIS CAVALLO: It is not a problem.

JOHN CAVALLO: Thank you.

CHRIS CAVALLO: Thank you. I am glad you recognize that. I hope to expand on that and hopefully this can help too.

TRUSTEE POMBONYO: Good. Good.

CHRIS CAVALLO: That's part of our goal.

It is part of the community and we're very happy here.

TRUSTEE POMBONYO: You work with the students. It is very helpful.

CHRIS CAVALLO: There's no need to thank us for that. Thank you for your work.

TRUSTEE POMBONYO: In terms of the changes, you are going to be selling that beer on tap as well as in bottle, both?

JOHN CAVALLO: We're thinking about it.
We're not too sure. See what fits best in the restaurant. If we did, maybe one tap and bottle.

CHRIS CAVALLO: Like a beer of the month and then, you know, cans and bottles and that's that. We put wine in the permit. We don't know if we will implement that. We're not sure. The gentleman that helped us with the fine and permits helped us apply for it. We don't have to serve it. We take everything one day at a time. We'll develop as we go. If you need any information as we develop, that's not a problem. We will accommodate you with whatever you guys need or request. That sort of thing.

TRUSTEE POMBONYO: For those of us who do take-out, you might have mentioned this, but to

clarify, for those who do take-out, can you order bottles of beer to go with the food that you order for the take-out? Will you be selling it that way?

JOHN CAVALLO: They said if we're doing deliveries, we can but we're not selling outside, like if someone calls to the house and asks us to deliver six beers, we don't even deliver. So that wouldn't be that. They said that legally by New York State, if someone came in and ate and had a bottle of wine and they didn't finish it, they're allowed to take the wine home if they cork it and put it on top and take it home. But only if they eat. They can't take it home. That will be New York State. I don't see -- we're not delivering alcohol to the homes, no.

TRUSTEE POMBONYO: Thank you.

TRUSTEE CHENG: If I'm not mistaken, the

New York State Liquor Authority rules, you

can't just walk out from a restaurant with a

bottle of beer. You can buy a six pack, put it

in a bag and take it out. Please be corrected.

That's my understanding. That's the old days.

JOHN CAVALLO: When she mentioned during

the permit, she said something along those lines, that was part of the plan. But I think you're right with that kind of thing.

TRUSTEE CHENG: I'm pretty sure I am.

CHRIS CAVALLO: You have both. They can buy a six pack, take it to go. We're not looking to sell.

JOHN CAVALLO: If we do catering events, provide catering at -- beer at catering events.

TRUSTEE CHENG: It is kind of funny when you look out and see, I didn't know they're old enough to drink. Now they're getting a liquor license.

CHRIS CAVALLO: We were surprised they permit and stuff like that. We don't even do their and cook and out of there.

enough to drink yet. I have to say and I will say this for the record, that unfortunately you have the distinct privilege of living around the corner, of having a business around the corner from a trustee who passes your place everyday and I see the way you operate and I see the way you maintain the front. I see how your deliveries come in at present. Yes, they

have the pickup truck with the giant grill on the back. That's the necessary evil you have to go through when you're picking it up.

CHRIS CAVALLO: It is 450 pounds.

TRUSTEE CHENG: I never heard a complaint by a neighbor in that vicinity as to how you're operate your business. I don't see this personally to be any kind of real issue.

JOHN CAVALLO: Okay.

TRUSTEE CHENG: Obviously, if you don't follow the rules that's why we have our police department and I'm not concerned about it. I know you gentlemen and I think it sounds like you have --

TRUSTEE CHIARA: Might have to do a little more quality control. I have no questions.

Good luck. Thank you very much.

JOHN CAVALLO: Thank you.

CHRIS CAVALLO: Thank you.

MAYOR LONGOBARDI: Not to make this go longer, but I do echo Trustee Cheng. As you know, not only are you around the corner from the trustee, but you are around the corner from the Mayor.

But the reality is again, thank you very

much for everything you have done for the community. It is an extremely popular place and extremely popular in my house. It is the type of thing where we see a business like that and we see how everything, how well it's run, it is for our community. We try to help.

Again, we will deliberate this. We always do. But the reality is, we do thank you for everything you have done for the community and again, having a solid establishment, we hope to continue to many, many years and continued success.

CHRIS CAVALLO: Thank you.

JOHN CAVALLO: Thank you very much. I appreciate it.

MAYOR LONGOBARDI: With that, I will as you to sit down and at this time, I'll invite anyone from the public to speak. They may not have the same comments, but we will --

JOHN CAVALLO: Thank you very much again.
