Prior to the Special Use Permit Public Hearing and the Board of Trustees Regular Meeting, the Village Board held the Swearing-In Ceremony of the Fire Chief and Assistant Fire Chiefs at 7:15 PM outside Fire Department Headquarters on Vernon Street.

Present were Mayor Kevin M. Fitzgerald, Trustees Lynn Pombonyo, Archie T. Cheng, Frank J. Chiara, and Jennifer Stewart. The Village Board heard outgoing Fire Chief Patrick McAllister's annual report as follows:

Mayor Kevin Fitzgerald, Former Mayor Dominic Longobardi, Deputy Mayor Dr. Lynn Pombonyo, Fire Commissioner and Trustee Archie Cheng, Trustee Frank Chiara, Trustee Jen Stewart, Members of the Village Administration, Member of the Department, Residents and Guests:

I stand before you tonight extremely honored and humbled as Chief of the Floral Park Fire Department to give my final report for the year 2020-2021. Words cannot describe how proud I am of the dedication and hard work the volunteers of the Floral Park Fire Department put forth during one of the most demanding years this Department has experienced. They are an incredible group, and I thank each and every one of you for your service to our Floral Park community.

This is the status of our department:

Membership:

The Department currently has 167 members consisting of the following:

Active membership is 99 including firefighters and EMS, 26 Past and Present Chiefs, 3 Honorary Chiefs, 12 Probationary members.
28 Associate Members
2 Chaplains

This year we swore in 7 new members and had 3 resignations.

Alarms:

The most important thing we do is respond to emergencies to assist those in need of help.

For the year:

EMS Calls:	876
Fire Calls:	112
Auto Accidents:	322
Hazmat/Hazmat related calls:	41
Carbon Monoxide Alarms/incidents:	28
Mutual Aid to other towns:	03

This year total fire loss is estimated to be \$6,000,000.

Training:

Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, most of the scheduled training that the department would normally participate in was cancelled. Members received FSA (Fire Service Academy) Training in September 2020 with only a limited number of members attending due to COVID-19 restrictions. Our members received on the job training at the four fires in our Village over the last year as well as the numerous EMS calls to assist the community with their medical issues.

Probationary Training:

We were fortunate enough to get seven probationary firefighters through our in-house fire department training. I would like to thank Chief Brian Hamerman and Fire Fighters Patrick Conway and Bill Hecker for this accomplishment under difficult circumstances.

Purchasing:

This year there were 63 purchase orders and 124 vouchers processed. Thank you to Village Administrator/Treasurer Gerry Bambrick and Village Deputy Treasurer Kathleen Mack for all your help and assistance with our purchasing needs.

Medical and Fit Testing:

Each year our members are required to take an OSHA medical and interior fire fighters are required to be fit tested for their SCBA mask. Thank you to Chief Dodson and our recently deceased member William Hecker for overseeing this and ensuring our members stay current and up to date on their certification.

Radios:

Radio communication continues to be an ongoing problem. We constantly strive to find solutions and improve on what is our most important piece of equipment; our ability to communicate. I would like to thank Chief Saville for his tireless work spending hours on the phone to resolve these communication issues. We are looking into and researching new ways to communicate going forward.

Word Orders:

This equipment requires heavy maintenance and needs to be always in top working order as someone’s life may depend on it. This year 23 vehicle work orders and 25 house work orders kept these vehicles in operation. Thank you to Superintendent Kevin Ginnane and all the village mechanics for your hard work and dedication to our fleet.

Pump, Ladder, and Hose Testing:

All ladders and hoses were tested as required. Any damaged hose was removed and replaced. All three engines went to the Academy for the annual pump test. I am happy to report all equipment is in good working order.

Explorers:

Our Explorer Program was on pause this year out of safety concerns for the Explorers due to the COVID-19 pandemic. We look forward to this program restarting under the leadership of Chief Florio, Ex-Captain Georke, their advisers and members.

Parade:

As you can guess, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, there were no scheduled “normal” parades this year. The Floral Park Fire Department did participate in numerous drive-by celebrations for members of our community celebrating Memorial Day, birthdays, retirements, graduations, and family events. We were more than happy to accommodate these requests as bringing joy in a year that had so much sadness was a welcome change of pace for all of us.

Fire Prevention:

As the year progressed, we were limited as to what we could do as a department pertaining to fire prevention. I applaud Chief Hamerman and his committee for conducting school fire drills to educate our students and school staff in fire safety. I also want to thank Chiefs Bennett and Florio and their committee on completing 306 fire inspections keeping our places of business up to code in Floral Park in spite of the pandemic.

Thank You

This being an unprecedented year, the Fire Department had minimal in person interaction with the Board of Trustees as well as Village Administration. Yet you were there for us to assist with all our needs. If we needed a work order or a purchase order, you made it happen. Your support through some of our darkest days will always be remembered and appreciated. As the saying goes: “It takes a Village”.

Mayor Longobardi and the Board of Trustees: Thank you for all you have done and continue to do to support the Floral Park Fire Department. It is greatly appreciated. I also want to take this time to wish Mayor Fitzgerald a successful term in office. I know the Chief’s Staff is looking forward to working with you.

Commissioner McAllister: It has been a pleasure working with you and the entire Police Department. Thank you to all your officers and staff for a great job and their support.

To Gerry Bambrick, Sue Walsh and the Village Staff: Thank you for all of your hard work and help. You make the day-to-day things happen and it is very much appreciated.

To Chief O'Grady and Chief Wakely, Chief Longobardi and Paul Pinto: Thank you for all the tireless work you do behind the scenes in the office. You are the backbone of this operation.

Special thanks to Brian Naughton, Kevin Fogarty, Bobby Gartner and the members of the Active Engine Company for their support and always having my back.

As I said before, "It takes a Village". My staff was exceptional at a time when I needed an exceptional staff - Always there no matter what time of day. We held meetings and an hour after the meeting ended, the protocols had changed, and we had to have more meetings to keep up with the ever-changing COVID-19 guidelines. Mike, Jep, Brian, and Danny: I couldn't have done this without you!!! You are a great bunch of guys, and the Department is in great hands along with our newest addition Gil Luger.

My term started off with a bang when Chief Arrigo tested positive for the Coronavirus. During the transfer of power in April 2020 it felt like Sal Arrigo was handing over the keys to the Titanic. Things didn't get much better for a long time after that. We lost a lot of good people in 2020. Mayor Longobardi's mother and mother-in-law just to name a few. You have the department's deepest condolences.

The rescue company went above and beyond what was expected of them - putting themselves and their families in personal danger as members of the department were not vaccinated until late December, early January. It would not be unusual to take a husband to the hospital with signs of Covid, only to return the following week because his wife was experiencing symptoms. At many of these calls, we were unsure if these patients would ever be returning home to their families again.

The Department was also experiencing a crisis within a crisis due to a shortage of PPE until Chuck Zuba and Kenny Fairben stepped in. They managed to keep the first battalion supplied with the necessary PPE from the EOC. Thank you Chuck and Kenny for keeping the Department safe.

I asked Chief Bennett to compile a list of members who wanted to be vaccinated when the time came. He reached out to rescue member Marty Cook, also our infectious disease officer, and Marty's response was, and I quote "My chemo therapy is running an hour late but as soon as I get out of here I will get this started." That's the kind of guy Marty is. May God bless you Marty Cook. Ladies and Gentlemen: It truly takes a Village. Chief Dodson and all the officers of the companies completed this Herculean task and got everyone who was interested a vaccination appt.

This was a heck of a year for Rescue and I want to thank all who participated. I don't want to mention names because I don't want to leave anyone out - but you know who you are. You have the thanks and gratitude of the entire Village.

I've said it takes a village but in this particular instance, it took villages. On a beautiful September morning, what we thought was probably going to be a quick kitchen fire at Park Place, turned out to be a nine and a half hour ordeal. A fire scene can be best defined as total chaos. The quicker you get the chaos under control, the better the scene becomes. It took numerous fire depts. from as far away as Plandome, which gave Chief Mike Saville the opportunity to work alongside his brother Rob Saville, to help us stop a large volume of fire in the row of stores on Covert Avenue. As Chief Saville and I saw smoke coming from both ends of the street, we decided to make a stand at the fire wall located at the Nail Salon. We put all our resources to fight off the progression of fire and save the remaining six stores. Thank you to all the surrounding fire departments that responded and provided assistance to our village.

This fire was unusual due to how many hours it took to get under control. The store owners and merchants watched as their livelihoods went up in flames, and they offered us hugs, handshakes and thanked us for our efforts to help save their stores. They offered to send food to the fire fighters who were injured while fighting the fire. Floral Park is truly a great place to live!

In November 2020 at 146 Jericho Turnpike the Floral Park Fire Department made quick work of a fire in an apartment and were able to remove all the occupants.

Only 11 days later on November 22 at 58 Webster, we once again responded to a fully involved house fire. Several people in the home were able to self-evacuate and it was amazing to watch the Floral Park Fire Department contain the fire to the second floor while the roof slowly collapsed.

On March 16, 2021, at approximately 1806 hours, the Floral Park Fire Department responded to a house fire at 44 Hitchcock. Quick work contained the fire to the back of the house and the occupant was also able to self-evacuate from his home.

All of these fires were put out by volunteer members of the Floral Park Fire Department. As a Chief, it makes me very proud to see how professional and adept our members are at putting out fires in short order. I want to thank all my members for a job well done and the fact that there were no fatalities during the course of any of these fires. This is a reflection upon your professionalism during these chaotic situations. God bless you one and all.

To my wife Joan and daughters: Jessica, Breanna and Hannah: I want to thank all of you for your support and patience over the years. I often had to run out from the dinner table or a soccer game or I was late to pick someone up because I was answering calls that occurred in the Village. They always seem to come at the worst possible moment, and I thank you for your understanding. I Love you guys – I could not have done this without your support!

It is my deepest regret to report a line of duty death of William (Billy) Hecker, a 31-year member of the Floral Park Fire Department. When I first met Billy as a fire fighter, I thought he was bat “&*\$#” crazy having us wash the fire hose as we put it back on the truck. It wasn’t until I was Chief that I was fully able to appreciate Billy. If you gave him an assignment or a task, he always gave 110%. Billy was a dedicated and devoted member of this Fire Department, and his contributions will always be remembered. I hope that you will keep him and his wife Peg in your prayers as Peg continues to recover from symptoms from the Coronavirus.

Mayor Fitzgerald, Board of Trustees: It is my honor to turn over the keys of the titanic to this crew of men that will be able to right this ship and get it back to the normal way we do things.
