1           MAYOR FITZGERALD: Good evening. I want  
2 to ask that you stand for the Pledge of  
3 Allegiance.

4                   (Pledge of Allegiance said.)

5           MAYOR FITZGERALD: So good evening and  
6 welcome to our second meeting of 2023.  
7 Tonight, we have a public hearing then followed  
8 by kind of a short agenda this time and open it  
9 up for public questions, comments and concerns.

10           And with that, Miss Walsh, can you start  
11 the public hearing for music at The Harrison.

12           MS. WALSH: Thank you, Mayor Fitzgerald.  
13 Legal Notice. Notice of Special Use Public  
14 Hearing Incorporated Village of Floral Park,  
15 New York.

16           Notice is Hereby Given that the Board of  
17 Trustees of the Incorporated Village of Floral  
18 Park, New York will hold a Public Hearing at  
19 Village Hall, One Floral Boulevard, Floral  
20 Park, New York on Tuesday, January 17, 2023 at  
21 8:00 p.m. in relation to the following  
22 application:

23           The application of The Harrison, 86 South  
24 Tyson, LLC/Vincent DiRico, owner of 86 South  
25 Tyson Avenue, Floral Park, New York is made in

1           accordance with Article III, Section 99-10B (1)  
2           of the Zoning Ordinance of the Incorporated  
3           Village of Floral Park, New York, to modify  
4           Special Use Permit, Resolution number 2021-118,  
5           so as to allow for live music on premises in a  
6           B-1 District, the use may only be authorized as  
7           a special use after a public hearing.

8                     The structure for which said Special  
9           Permit is applied is situated on the northwest  
10          corner of South Tyson Avenue/Tyson Avenue  
11          extension and known as Section 32, Block 55 and  
12          Lot 16 on the Nassau County Land and Tax Map.

13                    A copy of the application is on file in  
14          the Office of the Village Clerk, One Floral  
15          Boulevard, Floral Park, New York and may be  
16          examined by any persons interested therein  
17          during business hours Monday through Friday,  
18          inclusive, except legal holidays, from 8:30  
19          a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

20                    Now Take Notice that all parties in  
21          interest and citizens will be given the  
22          opportunity to be heard at the aforesaid time  
23          and place.

24                    By Order of The Board of Trustees

3 And that the Legal Notice has been

7 MAYOR FITZGERALD: Thank you, Miss Walsh.  
8 I would like to place on the record the  
9 applicant previously filed an affidavit of  
10 service indicating that all neighbors within a  
11 200 foot radius of the dwelling have been  
12 served with notice.

13 I would also like to announce that the  
14 Board previously adopted a resolution  
15 determining that the application does not have  
16 a significant impact on the environment as  
17 defined by SEQRA.

18 Now, I would like to invite Mr. DiRico to  
19 come up and give, be sworn in and present what  
20 he is looking to do.

21 (Whereupon, Vincent DiRico was sworn in.)

22 VINCENT DIRICO: Vincent DiRico, 86 South  
23 Tyson Avenue, Floral Park 11001.

24 MAYOR FITZGERALD: So, we understand that  
25 you want to have live music or that is not in

1 the original application that you made. If you  
2 could just describe what you are looking to do.

3 VINCENT DIRICO: I think -- sure. Thank  
4 you. I think what we want to do and how we do  
5 it as far as music is concerned, actually  
6 provides even the service to the community  
7 because it -- we have been established as a  
8 place for adults between Floral Park and  
9 surrounding towns to come to where they know  
10 they're in a safe environment. They can come  
11 and enjoy themselves. They know it is safe.

12 I think what we are looking to do as far  
13 as music is concerned is nothing crazy and when  
14 we do it, we have one to three piece band in  
15 for reasonable hours. It doesn't draw -- we're  
16 not looking for a very young crowd. We're  
17 looking for an adult crowd that likes to come,  
18 have something to eat, drink, enjoy some music.

19 The hours of operation that we run are  
20 early. We don't run late operation. So again,  
21 I think it is something that people in the  
22 community will look forward to and it adds, I  
23 think, it adds to Floral Park, gives people an  
24 opportunity who live in Floral Park and close  
25 by not to have to travel and go to other towns

1 to get this. The music is really soft. It is  
2 not anything hardcore or multiples, you know,  
3 big band type of situation.

4 So I really, I'm open to the floor and if  
5 you have any questions or concerns that people  
6 might have, I'll answer them.

7 MAYOR FITZGERALD: I am sure we have a  
8 number of questions. Tell us what you are  
9 willing to do, what it is and what it won't be.

10 VINCENT DIRICO: I think we're looking to  
11 do, again, music that is muted, whether it be  
12 soft rock, Jazz, vocals, theme nights, for  
13 instance like October Fest. It could be a  
14 German music thing or going back to basic type  
15 of music either vocals or instrumentals with  
16 guitar.

17 MAYOR FITZGERALD: So, I guess you mention  
18 guitars. What type of instruments would it be?

19 VINCENT DIRICO: Mostly guitars. Maybe a  
20 little bit of soft, you know, organ music,  
21 piano music, in that sense. Really no drums or  
22 loud music.

23 MAYOR FITZGERALD: No drums or drum  
24 machines?

25 VINCENT DIRICO: No music like that.

1           Nothing that would be -- I don't think it will  
2           be a nuisance.

3           MAYOR FITZGERALD:  Would it be heard from  
4           the street?

5           VINCENT DIRICO:  I don't think you have an  
6           issue as far as, especially with the  
7           surroundings we do it.  It's not really an  
8           issue again, obstructive to the surrounding  
9           neighborhood at all.

10          MAYOR FITZGERALD:  Would you hear it from  
11          the street, yes or no?

12          VINCENT DIRICO:  You know what, I don't  
13          want to say something.  Personally, I think  
14          that if I stand outside, right outside, it's  
15          very low.  It is not nothing that is, to me,  
16          personally anything loud or obstructive or  
17          anything that's a nuisance to the neighborhood.  
18          I don't really think so.

19          MAYOR FITZGERALD:  Will the apartments  
20          across the street hear it?

21          VINCENT DIRICO:  I don't know because I  
22          don't, we haven't had any problems.  We don't  
23          think we will have any problems with the  
24          surrounding.  Like anything else, I think if  
25          your windows are closed, you know, it is not an

1 issue. If the windows are open, I don't think  
2 it is anything that we're not looking for club  
3 sense. We're not doing clubs. We're not doing  
4 cover door situations. We're not dancing,  
5 anything like that. If anything, it is an  
6 accent to the restaurant and that's what I  
7 think it really is.

8 MAYOR FITZGERALD: Would you have to move  
9 tables in the event you have certain bands or  
10 the tables are going to remain as is?

11 VINCENT DIRICO: It is really not, it's  
12 really not meant to be, you know, we're not  
13 providing a dance floor. We're not providing  
14 space big enough. It is really if people want  
15 to enjoy themselves in a place, dance a little  
16 or move a little. That's fine. We're not  
17 providing any environment. It is not by any  
18 means meant to be any type of concert  
19 situation, not to be in sort of a club or D.J.  
20 I don't think that's what we stand for. I  
21 think we have proven in the last four years who  
22 we are and what we stand for. I would like to  
23 think that we're a positive member of the  
24 community with no issues.

25 MAYOR FITZGERALD: Would there be any new

1 lighting put in and/or a stage with stage  
2 lighting?

3 VINCENT DIRICO: Absolutely not. That  
4 goes against my whole esthetics and decor or  
5 anything, so no.

6 MAYOR FITZGERALD: Okay. Anyone have any  
7 questions?

8 TRUSTEE POMBONYO: Good evening and  
9 welcome.

10 VINCENT DIRICO: Hi.

11 TRUSTEE POMBONYO: Where would the band or  
12 music be placed, towards the back, towards the  
13 side, towards the door?

14 VINCENT DIRICO: Could be two places. It  
15 could be by the side where it is right now or  
16 can be either sometimes inside with the doors  
17 open, inside going out or it can be, or just on  
18 the side of the bar actually facing the actual  
19 dining establishment.

20 TRUSTEE POMBONYO: Do you expect to be a  
21 crowd mainly to have dinner and at the bar or  
22 are you expecting a crowd out there? Inside  
23 you have a great crowd that comes there for a  
24 while and they have a great time. Is that what  
25 you are envisioning outside?

1           VINCENT DIRICO: From an operator  
2 perspective, it is always best when people eat  
3 and drink. We're not looking for anybody to  
4 just not. There's nothing wrong with it having  
5 a couple of things they want to have. But we  
6 prefer when people relax and are eating and  
7 drinking. Not really just the bar.

8           TRUSTEE POMBONYO: Do you currently  
9 outside have any issues with occupancy  
10 maximums? Do you get crowds out there?

11           VINCENT DIRICO: I don't believe, no.  
12 Again, we're not the type of place that people  
13 are coming in large crowds. I think that's one  
14 of the reasons why, one of the reasons they  
15 like coming to us. They know it is not that  
16 kind of environment. They know it is an  
17 environment where they're not going to be  
18 packed like sardines. It is not supposed to  
19 be. First of all, we don't want it. Between  
20 the occupancy of the tables and actual bar  
21 stools that are there and people come to us  
22 because they feel safe, they feel it is a good  
23 environment to go out with their friends or  
24 significant other and it is a nice place to go  
25 where they don't have to travel necessarily out

1 of town. Not that there is anything wrong with  
2 regular bars and young crowds, but it is not  
3 our thing.

4 TRUSTEE POMBONYO: Everyone should fit  
5 comfortably with the music.

6 VINCENT DIRICO: Yes.

7 TRUSTEE POMBONYO: Thank you.

8 MAYOR FITZGERALD: Trustee Chiara.

9 TRUSTEE CHIARA: Is this music going to be  
10 amplified or will there be amplifiers in there?

11 VINCENT DIRICO: It is low, depending on  
12 the artist or how they play. I think you  
13 need -- there can be acoustic. It also, if it  
14 is small and to give proper electrified sounds,  
15 to give the sounds further music and not  
16 necessarily about being loud. It is just part  
17 of how they play and sound.

18 TRUSTEE CHIARA: Will it continue during  
19 the night or just a certain time period?

20 VINCENT DIRICO: When we say night, even  
21 at night, I don't think it will be anything  
22 past 10 or 11:00. At that point, we really  
23 don't want it anyway. That's when we start  
24 dwindling down.

25 MAYOR FITZGERALD: Can you commit to 10?

1 Can you say 10 or 11?

2 VINCENT DIRICO: It will be safe to say I  
3 think we're fine with 11:00, to be honest with  
4 you.

5 MAYOR FITZGERALD: So, your request is 11?

6 VINCENT DIRICO: We don't need anything  
7 later than 11 at all. I'm not saying a late  
8 time because usually we end it earlier. So, 11  
9 will be good.

10 TRUSTEE CHIARA: Any of these performances  
11 increase your maximum capacity? Would you like  
12 big crowds showing up?

13 VINCENT DIRICO: I don't think it's about  
14 increasing our capacity but it is more like  
15 filling the seats that are available. For  
16 instance, because it is outdoors, we want to be  
17 able, not only have a nice crowd inside, but  
18 sometimes people have a different reason for  
19 wanting to seat outside because of the weather  
20 or just to hear music outside, where to watch  
21 the T.V. and sporting events on the T.V.  
22 outside. So, it's just an extra means of  
23 generating income and I think that's the main  
24 purpose.

25 TRUSTEE CHIARA: If you do it outside,

1 will the music be picked inside or vice-versa?

2 VINCENT DIRICO: The music, once we do it  
3 outside usually pertains to the room with the  
4 french doors that are open and outside. We  
5 tried the inside of the restaurant differently.  
6 The inside, because of the bar inside and  
7 dining room inside, it gives the people the  
8 opportunity that don't want to listen to music  
9 to have a regular dining experience. It is not  
10 one or nothing. It is basically again someone  
11 comes in and wants to have dinner or sit at the  
12 regular bar, don't want to be a part of it,  
13 they don't have to. It is not being piped in.

14 TRUSTEE CHIARA: Thank you.

15 MAYOR FITZGERALD: Trustee Stewart?

16 TRUSTEE STEWART: Hi. How are you? You  
17 said something about theme nights. Would you  
18 be looking to have any floor shows or anything  
19 that will require a cabaret license?

20 VINCENT DIRICO: No. No.

21 TRUSTEE STEWART: Okay. So, I don't want  
22 to put you on the spot, if you are considering  
23 having outdoor dining on Caroline Place for the  
24 take-out window, are you putting music out  
25 there as well?

1           VINCENT DIRICO: The space we have on the  
2 take-out side is really different, so we're not  
3 looking to put any music at all over there.

4           No. No, none.

5           TRUSTEE STEWART: Great.

6           VINCENT DIRICO: That's for people's  
7 take-out. They have quick access to grabbing  
8 food on their own. We don't want waitress  
9 service out there. It is a convenience for  
10 them, want a quick bite, they sit down.

11          TRUSTEE STEWART: Okay. So, to your  
12 knowledge, do you have any outstanding  
13 violations with the building department?

14          VINCENT DIRICO: To my knowledge, no.

15          TRUSTEE STEWART: You fixed the fence?

16          VINCENT DIRICO: Meaning the height?

17          TRUSTEE STEWART: Yes.

18          VINCENT DIRICO: The height we have to go  
19 for a zoning because it is two feet different.  
20 So, in reference to that, you might be right,  
21 we have to still finish applying for that. I  
22 thought we were good.

23          TRUSTEE STEWART: I don't believe you are.

24          VINCENT DIRICO: I think we have to go for  
25 the other two feet. I thought it was -- I

1 apologize.

2 TRUSTEE STEWART: Okay. I'm the garbage  
3 person. I ask questions about the garbage. I  
4 don't believe it will generate any additional  
5 trash?

6 VINCENT DIRICO: No, not at all.

7 TRUSTEE STEWART: I have to live up to my  
8 reputation. Sorry.

9 VINCENT DIRICO: No problem.

10 TRUSTEE STEWART: So, the T.V. you have  
11 outside, those are still no volume, correct?

12 VINCENT DIRICO: Yes. Yes.

13 TRUSTEE STEWART: Where would you expect  
14 the band members to park?

15 VINCENT DIRICO: They have to find, I  
16 expect them to find their own parking.

17 TRUSTEE STEWART: Where would they unload  
18 their equipment? It is really busy over there  
19 on Tyson.

20 VINCENT DIRICO: Yes.

21 TRUSTEE STEWART: Where we have placed, I  
22 think it is like a passenger drop off, you  
23 know, I don't know how long we will be okay  
24 with you holding that up with the band.

25 VINCENT DIRICO: I don't think, again, it

1 is not involving any major theatrical type of  
2 band or big band. So, I think, I don't see  
3 anything more than a five or ten minute quick  
4 drop and go.

5 TRUSTEE STEWART: Okay. Does this require  
6 an amendment to your liquor license?

7 VINCENT DIRICO: I don't believe so, but I  
8 will double check.

9 TRUSTEE STEWART: Okay. That's all I  
10 have.

11 MAYOR FITZGERALD: Trustee Longobardi.

12 TRUSTEE LONGOBARDI: Thank you for being  
13 here. Most of my questions got answered. You  
14 talk about using music to enhance the dining  
15 experience. Would you ever close the area and  
16 do a private party with music down there?

17 VINCENT DIRICO: I don't -- I think we  
18 have. It depends on the -- anything like that  
19 usually has to do with, honestly with charity  
20 style situation where actually a charity  
21 organization kind of wants a little bit of it  
22 for them to make money. But otherwise, I don't  
23 personally.

24 TRUSTEE LONGOBARDI: It is one thing to  
25 have a sitting dinner with back music and

1 having a private party that's loud and well  
2 over capacity.

3 VINCENT DIRICO: Right, it doesn't.  
4 Again, I would like to think over the last time  
5 we have been there close to four years, I think  
6 we have proven to be a good member of the  
7 community with no issues. I don't think it  
8 fits into the narrative of the way we operate.  
9 We don't like trouble, period, even for not  
10 just for the community, only for ourselves,  
11 only the safety of the patrons and our  
12 employees and surrounding community. We don't  
13 have tolerance for that. We don't really care.  
14 I would much rather have somebody again  
15 sitting, eating and drinking, then just  
16 drinking because actually, it brings in more  
17 revenue if people eat and have something to eat  
18 then to just drink.

19 TRUSTEE LONGOBARDI: Thank you.

20 MR. RYAN: Mayor, can I ask a question?

21 MAYOR FITZGERALD: Sure.

22 MR. RYAN: I think I heard you say you  
23 were going to have music for special events,  
24 maybe October Fest. Did you say that?

25 VINCENT DIRICO: I said as far as October

1 Fest, giving an example of a special night as  
2 far as because again --

3 MR. RYAN: On these special nights, what  
4 kind of band would you have?

5 VINCENT DIRICO: The type of band could be  
6 one or two piece with a vocal. One or two with  
7 a vocal.

8 MR. RYAN: Unlike an Oompah band with the  
9 big October Fest?

10 VINCENT DIRICO: No. We don't have the  
11 size for that anyway. So, I know it will not  
12 happen because we don't, even if we wanted to.

13 MR. RYAN: You're limiting it to a three  
14 piece?

15 VINCENT DIRICO: Actually, totally.

16 MR. RYAN: Thank you.

17 VINCENT DIRICO: You're welcome.

18 MAYOR FITZGERALD: You mention 11:00 p.m.  
19 Which days would you have music and can you  
20 give me the days you have it, start and end  
21 times.

22 VINCENT DIRICO: Usually Thursday, Friday,  
23 Saturday, Sunday will be more unless sometimes  
24 Mondays could be because of a holiday weekend,  
25 Labor Day, Memorial Day. Especially people

1           it's -- I don't like loud because if I'm back  
2           there, personally if it is loud, it is ruining  
3           your dining experience anyway. To me,  
4           background music that is not like correct, it's  
5           not too low, but at the same time, if it is --  
6           if you can't talk and if you can't converse  
7           with your guests that you are with or company  
8           that you are with, to me, it is defeating the  
9           purpose. I don't want it.

10           MAYOR FITZGERALD: What time are you  
11           asking for on Sunday?

12           VINCENT DIRICO: As far as starting?

13           MAYOR FITZGERALD: Yes. Starting and  
14           ending.

15           VINCENT DIRICO: 12 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.  
16           usually on a Sunday.

17           MAYOR FITZGERALD: Would you be  
18           advertising what band is there or what person  
19           is there?

20           VINCENT DIRICO: We'd like to. We feel it  
21           will be more of a draw. For someplace,  
22           sometimes a little more of a following, local  
23           following. It will be helpful. We would like  
24           to do that. E-mail, through e-mail or through  
25           the website, that type, or through the regular

1 customer data base. We don't put big ads out.

2 TRUSTEE STEWART: So, would you be having  
3 a D.J. or not having a D.J.?

4 VINCENT DIRICO: Sunday brunch we'd like  
5 to.

6 TRUSTEE STEWART: I think you said earlier  
7 no.

8 VINCENT DIRICO: Sunday is the one day I  
9 think people like sometimes a D.J.

10 TRUSTEE STEWART: It is, but it isn't.

11 VINCENT DIRICO: I am not trying to be  
12 cute.

13 TRUSTEE STEWART: I just want to know.

14 VINCENT DIRICO: Maybe live one day.  
15 That's all I am saying.

16 TRUSTEE STEWART: Is the permit for live  
17 music or music?

18 MS. WALSH: Live music.

19 TRUSTEE STEWART: What prompted you to  
20 apply for the permit?

21 VINCENT DIRICO: We feel that people will  
22 enjoy again. I think we provide something for  
23 the local community that is adult oriented. It  
24 is not a young bar crowd. It is an adult way  
25 of being able to go out.

1 TRUSTEE STEWART: So when you are talking  
2 with your partners, you decided this is  
3 something you wanted to do and someone realized  
4 you needed a permit?

5 VINCENT DIRICO: Yes. I apologize. I  
6 know this is not a good excuse. Sometimes we  
7 don't know until we are told. It is not  
8 something we are trying to get away with or  
9 malicious.

10 MAYOR FITZGERALD: So, a difference, in my  
11 opinion, between a D.J. that plays music or a  
12 D.J. that puts on a show.

13 VINCENT DIRICO: No D.J. putting on a  
14 show.

15 MAYOR FITZGERALD: D.J, wedding shows,  
16 those kinds of stuff?

17 VINCENT DIRICO: Like I said, my own  
18 personal preference, I have a problem with  
19 things being too loud. I think it just takes  
20 away. If you can't converse with who you are  
21 with, it is defeating to the purpose to me.

22 MAYOR FITZGERALD: With that said, there  
23 will be no time there will be music without  
24 food and the kitchen being open?

25 VINCENT DIRICO: Absolutely not.

1           MAYOR FITZGERALD: Okay. Any other  
2 questions from the Board at this time?

3           TRUSTEE STEWART: Not at this time.

4           MAYOR FITZGERALD: Take a seat. I will  
5 open it up to the floor. Anyone here in the  
6 audience that would like to comment on this?  
7 Is there anyone on Zoom that would like to  
8 comment on this? No. Are there anymore  
9 questions of Mr. DiRico?

10          TRUSTEE STEWART: Not at this time.

11          MAYOR FITZGERALD: I ask for a motion to  
12 close the hearing and reserve decision.

13          TRUSTEE POMBONYO: So moved.

14          TRUSTEE CHIARA: Second.

15          MAYOR FITZGERALD: Miss Walsh, can you  
16 poll the Board.

17          MS. WALSH: Trustee Pombonyo?

18          TRUSTEE POMBONYO: Aye.

19          MS. WALSH: Trustee Chiara?

20          TRUSTEE CHIARA: Aye.

21          MS. WALSH: Trustee Stewart?
